## Competitive !

**LSE** is a highly competitive institution. The high level of competition means that achieving, or being predicted to achieve, our usual standard offer grades does not guarantee that an offer of admission will be made.

In 2024, we received approximately 28,000 applications for roughly 1,850 places. This fierce competition for places means that every year we unfortunately have to disappoint many applicants.

37% of applicants were offered a place to read Government and International Affairs

27% of applicants were offered a place to study Computer Science

80% of applicants were offered a place to read History

### Research!

The University- visit, look at online prospectuses

The Department- the specialisms within the department

The course- make notes on why these modules, topics, approaches interest you.

The style of teaching- hours of teaching/independent study

The style of assessments- coursework, summative assessments

## What constitutes a strong application?

Academic Profile : Mostly 8s and 9s at GCSE

Working at the top of your class –consistently highest marks

Predicted As and A\*s

Are you currently achieving A grades- how will your L6 exams go?

Are you top of your class?

Is there *empirical evidence* of your academic achievements- module tests, essay marks, competition scores, awards that could be cited by your teachers to show that you are performing at a very high level and comfortably exceeding that of your cohort?

This will look great on your teacher reference!

## From the London School of Economics

Selectors look for students who can best reflect on the experiences and academic ideas they have encountered through the opportunities available to them, not those who have had the best opportunities. If you are not sure where to start, you could try listening to podcasts of LSE public events or look in the prospectus for examples of suggested reading. Remember we are interested not just in a list of what you have read/encountered, but evidence you have reflected on the academic ideas.

To help you begin, there are several questions you could think about:

- Why have you chosen the course? What attracted you to the subject? Which aspects of the subject have interested you sufficiently to want to study it at degree level? Is there a specific area of the subject you wish to focus on? What are the big issues in the subject, and what do you find most interesting about them? What are your thoughts on these topics?
- Have you developed your subject interest outside of your school studies? For example, have you undertaken any additional reading to broaden your knowledge of the subject? Have you attended lectures or explored online material relating to the subject? What did you find interesting in your reading/in the lectures you attended and what are your thoughts on the topics covered?
