Information and visits

Traditionally there are a number of opportunities to visit the school during the course of the year. Open Morning

Tuesday 14 March 2023 10.30am to 12.30pm

An opportunity to be shown around the school by pupils on a normal working day and to meet the Senior Leadership and Admissions Teams.

Open Evening

Wednesday 7 June 2023 6.30pm to 8.30pm

An informal opportunity for families to look around the school and meet members of staff and pupils. There will be activities in each department for children to participate in and the Headmaster will also address visitors.

Parents' Online Admissions Q&A Session

Monday 11 September 2023 6.30pm to 7.30pm

A chance for parents to ask our Admissions Team questions relating to the admissions process and Entrance Examinations Day. This will be a live-streamed event.

Open Afternoon

Sunday 17 September 2023 2.00pm to 5.00pm

A final opportunity for families to look around the school prior to the Entrance Examinations Day on Saturday 11 November 2023.

Entrance Examinations 2024

Saturday 11 November 2023

All candidates must be registered before sitting the entrance examinations. Registrations, bursary and scholarship applications must be received by the deadline of **Friday 29 September 2023** to allow us to process the registration and contact schools for confidential references.

European nationals are asked to provide proof of their child's pre-settled or settled status as part of the government's EU Settlement Scheme as part of their application. Those without these statuses, and/or other international candidates, would need to provide visa and residence permit information.

Format of the day

Candidates should wear comfortable casual clothes and should bring a pen, two pencils, eraser and ruler.

Candidates for Years 9 and 10 should bring a scientific calculator, a protractor, a compass and a relevant language dictionary.

Candidates sit papers in English and Maths and for those looking at Year 9 and 10 a French or Spanish language paper. The papers vary in length from 45 minutes to 1 hour.

All candidates also sit a 50 minute online assessment which includes Verbal Reasoning, Non-Verbal Reasoning and Numerical Reasoning. More information is available under the relevant age group information on pages 4 and 5 of this booklet.

The online assessment will be provided by the Centre for Evaluation and Monitoring (CEM). The test is designed to enable all children to demonstrate their academic potential without the need for excessive preparation.

There are no practice papers available for the online assessment. CEM advises parents that children can best prepare for their online assessment by learning to work quietly on their own, completing homework set by their school, and by reading and making sure they understand all the words in any books they read. Children should also, wherever possible, be encouraged to try to solve problems by looking things up for themselves. Children should be familiar with using a keyboard and a mouse including the ability to click, drag and slide with a mouse.

Personal Interviews (Years 8, 9 and 10)

Additionally for those entering Years 8, 9 and 10 personal interviews will take place from September 2023 to week commencing Monday 6 November 2023. This is an informal 15 minute interview in English with Susan Harris, Head of Transition and Induction, or another senior member of staff, covering the candidate's interests, achievements, aspirations and communication skills.

Information to support your child's application

If you would like to submit information to support your child's application, (relating to for example their co-curricular activities, positions of responsibility, hobbies, interests and club/society memberships) you can do so at the point of registration either by sending hard copies to the Admissions Team or electronically by email to admissions@princethorpe. co.uk, clearly marking the information with your child's name and date of birth.



Additional Needs and Access Arrangements

Children with a special educational need or disability (SEND)* will be considered for access arrangements in the Entrance Examinations. Any access arrangements granted will be based on the child's normal way of working in their current educational environment, for which evidence will be required.

Following receipt of a registration form from any candidate with a learning need, the registration form and all supporting documents (including for example, Personal Learning Plan/Pupil Passport/One Page Profile (PLP), Individualised Education Plan (IEP), Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP), Educational Psychologist Report, SEND Specialist Assessment Report, Autism Diagnosis Report, Medical Report or Therapist Report) will be reviewed by a panel of experts from our Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Team.

The panel will decide upon any appropriate access arrangements for the Entrance Exams based on the evidence provided and the candidate's normal way of working. In more complex cases or if the panel has specific questions a meeting with one of our SEND Team will be arranged by the Registrars. Please ensure the Registrars receive your registration in good time, to enable this important review to take place.

Parents will be notified prior to the Entrance Examinations Day of the nature of any access arrangements granted or reasonable adjustments to be made.

*Cognition and learning, e.g. dyslexia, dysgraphia, dyspraxia, SEMH – social, emotional and mental health, Communication and interaction, e.g. Autism Spectrum, speech, language communication needs or Physical, medical, sensory impairment or mobility.

Admissions Policy and Right to Study Policy

Offers Made

After the entrance examinations are marked the Admissions Panel sits to discuss applications. The Panel will take into consideration the entrance examinations results, references from feeder schools and, for those with Special Educational Needs, any information and evidence provided.

Those entering Years 8, 9 and 10 will also have their personal interviews considered.

Exam results will be posted, first class, on **Thursday 30 November 2023**. No information will be available beforehand.

Acceptance Deadline

For those offered a place in **Year 8, 9 or 10** confirmation of acceptance with a £300 deposit is then required to secure the place, by **Monday 11 December 2023**.

For those offered a place in **Year 7** confirmation of acceptance with a £300 deposit is required to secure the place, by **Tuesday 5 March 2024**.

This deposit is refunded after the end of the final term which the pupil spends at Princethorpe.

The Year 7 acceptance deadline for places is, by a nationally agreed code of practice, the same for all independent schools, allowing parents and children time to review all their options, including those from the maintained sector, before making a final decision.

As per our *Terms and Conditions*; on receipt of your deposit and the signed Confirmation of Acceptance you enter into a legally binding agreement with the School. You are therefore advised to read the *Terms and Conditions* before signing the Confirmation of Acceptance.

Once you have confirmed your acceptance of a place and sent your £300 deposit you will receive an acknowledgment and a receipt. A Joining Pack will then be sent to you during the Easter holidays, this will include various permission forms and essential information on school life.

English

The English test, consisting of a short comprehension and an essay, lasts for one hour.

A short piece of free writing is also required.

The topic is often a hobby, interest, holiday or memorable event.

Mathematics

The Mathematics paper is non-calculator and lasts for 1 hour.

The four rules of arithmetic should be thoroughly known and practised; a good grasp of multiplication tables will be very useful.

Candidates should also be familiar with:

- Money calculations
- Time
 - Compass bearingsReflection and translation
- Fractions and decimalsDirected numbersRounding and place value
- Averages
- Inequality signs

Simple graphs and statistical charts should be understood. Basic shapes should be known and how to calculate their perimeter and area.

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Scholarships

Every year there is a high level of interest in Scholarships and for 2024 we are expanding the number of categories available for particularly able or talented candidates.

The scholarships available range from Academic, Art and Performing Arts (Choral, Drama, Music, Musical Theatre including Dance) to Sport. In addition, exceptional candidates who are both academically able and gifted and talented across a number of areas may be considered for an All-Rounder Scholarship, which would be awarded at the discretion of the Headmaster.

The number of awards is limited. Scholarships can be to a maximum reduction of 50% of tuition fees, however the majority are between 5% and 20%, and are awarded at point of entry. More than one scholarship can be applied for.

Scholarship awards may be revoked if scholars fail to fulfil the conditions on which they were awarded.

Academic Scholarships

Candidates applying for entry to Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 will be automatically considered for an Academic Scholarship when taking the entrance examinations.

During their time at Princethorpe academic scholars are invited to attend guest lectures and will be offered a variety of opportunities for stretch and challenge, such as undertaking a Project Qualification.

Academic Scholarship Interviews

Prospective Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 pupils who are being considered for an Academic Scholarship will be invited to an interview with the Headmaster, following the entrance examinations.

The parents/guardians of these candidates will be contacted by telephone from **Thursday 16 November 2023**. Only those being considered for these awards will be contacted. The interviews will take place on **Saturday 18 November 2023** and during week commencing **Monday 20 November 2023**.

Art Scholarships

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Art Scholarship Day: Wednesday 8 November 2023

All candidates wishing to be considered must complete an Art Scholarship application form and return it by **Friday 29 September 2023**.

Princethorpe Art Scholarships will be awarded to those pupils who, in the opinion of the Head of Art, Paul Hubball, demonstrate an ability to express ideas clearly in visual terms, to tackle and solve problems in an imaginative, original and expressive way and to be studious and single-minded in their approach to their study of Art. Art Scholars are expected to continue with Art on the curriculum at least until Year 11, and usually in the Sixth Form.

Wednesday 8 November 2023 will be set aside for scholarship interviews and assessments. Candidates should report to the Theatre Entrance at 9.30am. All materials and lunch will be provided. Candidates should be collected from the Theatre Entrance at 3.00pm.

The Assessment

The assessment will consist of two sessions, one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

The morning will involve studies in various media of still life objects. Candidates should practice drawing and painting manmade and organic forms.

Afternoon Session - Still Life in the Style of an Artist

Candidates should select an artist of their choice. The artist should have a distinct and recognisable style, e.g. Picasso, Matisse, Cezanne, Van Gogh, Hockney or Lichtenstein (these are just suggestions, you may wish to choose another). Preparatory studies should be made beforehand. These may consist of drawings and colour studies in any appropriate medium of the artist's work.

Candidates are required to prepare for a still life piece which emulates their chosen artist's work; it cannot be a direct copy of an existing piece.

Candidates will need to set up a still life with objects that are similar or the same as those in their chosen painting and either take photos of the still life or work directly from life. They may bring their objects or photographs with them on the day. They must also submit their preparatory studies in support of their final piece.

Candidates will be given one and a half hours to complete their still life in the style of an artist.

Candidates will be assessed on their skill in using their chosen medium as well as their ability to show a clear understanding of the style of their chosen artist in the final piece which should be A3 in size. All materials will be provided by the College and will include pencil, crayon, charcoal, pastel (oil and chalk), acrylic or watercolour paint (we cannot accommodate oil paint due to the fumes and drying times).



Interview and presentation of a portfolio

Candidates will also be expected to present a portfolio of some recent work during the day. Their portfolio should be brought along to the College on the day of the Art Scholarship Assessment.

Candidates should be able to answer general questions on Art and specific questions relative to their own work; they should be able to express ideas clearly and fluently. The portfolio will be returned to the candidate on Entrance Examinations Day.

The portfolio should consist of 10 pieces of work only and no larger than A2.

5 pieces must demonstrate the candidate's ability to draw the following:

- **1 x A4** tonal drawing of a sliced red pepper (slightly larger than life size)
- **1 x A4** colour drawing of a sliced tomato (larger than life size to fit page)
- **1 x A3** tonal drawing of a pair of laced shoes (life size - be creative with the composition of the drawing)
- 1 x A3 colour drawing of a reflective object (size depends on object)
- **1 x A3** tonal self portrait drawing (life size)

Plus 5 pieces of your choice (no larger than A2):

These pieces should aim to demonstrate the candidate's ability to tackle problems, to experiment with various media and techniques, to display visual awareness, to gather, investigate, analyse and record visual information. Photographs of any three-dimensional work can also be included.

Performing Arts Scholarships - Choral

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Auditions: Week commencing Monday 6 November 2023

Auditions for Choral Scholarships will be held during the week commencing **Monday 6 November 2023** with Gil Cowlishaw, the Director of Music.

The Registrars will advise all candidates of the time of their auditions.

All candidates wishing to be considered must complete a Music Scholarship application form and return it by **Friday 29 September 2023**.

It is a stipulation that all Choral Scholars play an active part in the musical life of the school, eg perform in both the College Choir and the Vocalize Ensemble, and are available for any tours, stage productions and concerts, putting rehearsals as a priority over other co-curricular activities.

Requirements for Choral Scholarship candidates

- A standard of Grade 2 or equivalent
- Passion for singing within a public forum

The Audition

All candidates must attend a practical audition.

At the audition they will be required to:

- Perform two contrasting pieces of their choice
- Sit an aural test
- Participate in a viva voce, where they will be asked about their music-making, hobbies, etc.

Piano accompaniments should be brought to the audition. An accompanist will be provided unless a candidate prefers to be accompanied by an external accompanist they elect to bring with them. Candidates are advised to perform music with which they are comfortable, rather than singing music which is technically beyond them. We are looking for potential, commitment and reliability.

Names, email addresses and telephone numbers of two referees must be supplied, one of which should be the school music teacher or conductor of a choir in which the candidate regularly performs.



Performing Arts Scholarships – Drama

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Audition Workshop: Tuesday 17 October 2023

Auditions for Drama Scholarships will be held on **Tuesday 17 October 2023** with Aileen Cefaliello and Vicky Roberts, the joint Heads of Drama.

The Registrars will advise all candidates of the time of their auditions.

All candidates wishing to be considered must complete a Drama Scholarship application form and return it by **Friday 29 September 2023**.

It is a stipulation that all Drama Scholars play an active part in the performance life of the school, eg take part in stage productions, support Theatre opportunities and are available for any tours, putting rehearsals as a priority over other co-curricular activities.

Requirements for Drama Scholarship candidates

- Performed in stage productions inside and outside of school
- Passion for preforming within a public forum

The Audition

All candidates must attend a practical audition.

At the audition they will be required to:

- Perform a 45 90 second audition piece which can be selfscripted or a published piece as a monologue
- Lead a group through the creative process
- Take an active part in a teacher led workshop
- Participate in a viva voce, where they will be asked about their stage performances, hobbies, etc.

We are looking for potential, commitment and reliability.

Names, email addresses and telephone numbers of two referees must be supplied, one of which should be the school drama teacher or director of a stage school in which the candidate regularly performs.

Performing Arts Scholarships - Music

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Auditions: Week commencing Monday 6 November 2023

Auditions for Music Scholarships will be held during the week commencing **Monday 6 November 2023** with Gil Cowlishaw, the Director of Music.

The Registrars will advise all candidates of the time of their auditions. All candidates wishing to be considered must complete a Music Scholarship application form and return it by **Friday 29 September 2023**.

It is a stipulation that all Music Scholars play an active part in the musical life of the school, eg sing in the College Choir, play in the Concert Band and/or String Orchestra and are available for any tours, stage productions and concerts, putting rehearsals as a priority over other co-curricular activities.

Music Scholars are expected to continue with Music on the curriculum at least until Year 11, and usually in the Sixth Form.

Requirements for Music Scholarship candidates

This is a guide only, as candidates' background will vary.

Entry to Year 7	A standard of Grade 4 ABRSM or equivalent, on woodwind, brass, percussion or piano. Grade 3 on any stringed instrument.
Entry to Year 8	A standard of Grade 5 ABRSM or equivalent, on woodwind, brass or percussion. Grade 4 on any stringed instrument or piano.
Entry to Year 9 or 10	A standard of Grade 6 ABRSM or equivalent, on woodwind, brass or percussion. Grade 5 on any stringed instrument or piano.

The Audition

All candidates must attend a practical audition.

At the audition they will be required to:

- Perform 2 pieces on the instrument of their first choice
- Perform 1 piece on the instrument of their second choice
- Sing a song of their own choice
- Play the panel's selection of scales and arpeggios from the ABRSM or Trinity grade that best reflects their current standard, and undertake an aural test of the same standard
- Participate in a viva voce, where they will be asked about their music-making, hobbies, etc.

Piano accompaniments should be brought to the audition. An accompanist will be provided unless a candidate prefers to be accompanied by an external accompanist they elect to bring with them. Candidates are advised to perform music with which they are comfortable, rather than playing music which is technically beyond them.

We are looking for potential, commitment and reliability. Names, email addresses and telephone numbers of two referees must be supplied, one of which should be the school music teacher or conductor of a music group or orchestra in which the candidate regularly performs.



Performing Arts Scholarships – Musical Theatre (including Dance)

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Audition Workshop: Thursday 19 October 2023

Auditions for Musical Theatre Scholarships will be held on **Thursday 19 October 2023** with Gil Cowlishaw, Aileen Cefaliello and Vicky Roberts, the Director of Music and the joint Heads of Drama.

The Registrars will advise all candidates of the time of their auditions.

All candidates wishing to be considered must complete a Musical Theatre Scholarship application form and return it by Friday 29 September 2023.

It is a stipulation that all Musical Theatre Scholars play an active part in the performance life of the school, eg take part in the College Choir or Vocalize Ensemble, stage productions, support Theatre opportunities and are available for any tours, putting rehearsals as a priority over other co-curricular activities.

Requirements for Musical Theatre Scholarship candidates

- Performed in stage productions inside and outside of school
- Passion for performing within a public forum

The Audition

All candidates must attend a practical audition.

At the audition they will be required to:

- Perform a 45 90 sec monologue from a Musical Theatre piece
- Sing two pieces of Musical Theatre
- Sit an aural test
- Perform a pre-learnt movement/dance
- Participate in a viva voce, where they will be asked about their stage performances, hobbies, etc.

We are looking for potential, commitment and reliability.

Names, email addresses and telephone numbers of two referees must be supplied, one of which should be the school drama teacher or director of a stage school in which the candidate regularly performs.

Sport Scholarships (Years 7 to 10)

Deadline for applications: Friday 29 September 2023 Sport Scholarships Assessment Morning: Monday 16 October 2023

The live assessment session for the Sports Scholarships will be held on **Monday 16 October 2023** with Lee Cassell, Jen Law and Joe Jackson, Director of Sport and Heads of Girls' and Boys' Games.

All candidates wishing to be considered must complete a Sports Scholarship application form and return it by **Friday 29 September 2023**. These will then be reviewed by the panel and top candidates will be invited for the live assessment session.

The Registrars will advise all candidates if they are required to attend.

It is a stipulation that all Sports Scholars play an active part in the sporting programme of the College and model the sport behaviour required.

Requirements for Sport Scholarship candidates

- Member of a junior pathway or academy
- Key player at club level for your chosen sport/s
- Represent your school at A team level for your chosen sport/s

Live Sport Assessment Session

Invited candidates will be required to:

- Take part in a baseline data gathering task
- Participate in a games for understanding session
- Take part in a conditioned competitive session for their sport
- Participate in a viva voce, where they will be asked about their sport, hobbies, commitments etc.

We are looking for potential, commitment and reliability.

Names, email addresses and telephone numbers of two referees must be supplied, one of which should be their lead coach from their performance level organisation, club coach or school sports teacher.



Bursaries and Thomas More Scholarship

The Foundation wishes to extend the benefit of the school's Catholic ethos, academic and social excellence to families who may not be able to pay full fees through the provision of financial assistance by way of bursaries and the Thomas More Scholarship.

Bursaries

Every year there is a high level of interest in Bursaries and the number of awards are limited. Bursaries can be available for up to 100% of tuition fees, plus additional educational expenses. Bursaries are available for all external candidates, primarily for entry into Princethorpe College, regardless of current school or religion.

In addition to support with fees, children granted bursaries may be eligible for a reduction in the cost of music lessons at the College with our peripatetic music teachers.

Whilst the main financial criteria for the award are household income and net assets each application is considered on its own merits. Costs associated with dependant sick or disabled children will be taken into account and an allowance is made where there are other children already in the Foundation.

Our general guidance is that currently bursaries are not normally granted where gross household income exceeds £60,000 per annum and/or total net assets exceed £250,000.

Applications are made via an online system, please contact feessupport@princethorpe.co.uk to be sent a link to the system.

Please note that the process is time consuming.

Applications for bursaries are means-tested and reviewed by external consultants. The process is time consuming and parents are asked to note the following:

- Parents are required to complete the application and also submit supporting documentation in good time to complete the process before the deadline date of Friday 29 September 2023
- An interview with the external consultants is required
- Interviews will take place between July and October 2023
- All bursary applications must be accompanied by a completed registration form and payment.
- Any bursary applicants applying after the deadline date will be considered after on time applicants.

The Thomas More Scholarship

The Thomas More Scholarship is a means-tested scholarship for Catholic children aged 11 by **31 August 2023**, who attend a Catholic state primary school.

The application process is the same as for bursaries except letters of recommendation signed by the Parish Priest and current Headteacher are also required. The letters should include details of the length of time that the candidate has been known to them and confirmation of the candidate's date of baptism.

Applications for the Thomas More Scholarship should be received by **Friday 29 September 2023** and be accompanied by a completed registration form.

Bursaries and Thomas More Scholarship Advice of Outcomes only

The result of Bursary and Thomas More Scholarship applications will be advised in the letter regarding the examination results which will be sent to parents on **Thursday 30 November 2023**. Those Bursary and Thomas More Scholarship applications which do not meet the necessary financial criteria will be notified before the Entrance Examinations Day.
